
Usnea articulata in Wales: a rare species on the move

The beard-lichen *Usnea articulata* is both very rare and very distinctive, making it one of the higher profile lichens on the Section 42 list. Indeed its long-pendant thalli – hanging or snagged among twigs – are noticeable even from a moving car. Its identification and historic range in Wales are detailed on http://wales-lichens.org.uk/species-accounts/usnea-articulata and are repeated below.

Most of the Welsh population of *Usnea articulata* is in Pembrokeshire, but even there it is sparsely distributed and seldom encountered. At least 10 colonies were thought to be extant in the county by 2010, including those at Stackpole NNR and Llangloffan NNR that include two or three separate subcolonies. The BLS database also includes undated older records from SM70 and SM90. Three Glamorgan sites were known when the *Glamorgan Flora* was written in 1994: at Whiteford Burrows, Pennard Burrows and Kenfig Burrows. The Cardiganshire population at Hafod was last seen in the 18th century, and other colonies in SN55, SN65, SN75 and SN87 have also been lost, as has the only Radnorshire population in SO06. These inland losses are thought to result from Sulphur Dioxide pollution, although some may have been small and/or transient if the current situation is anything to judge by. *Usnea articulata* has been included on Section 42 of the NERC act, making it a species of "principal importance for conservation of biological diversity in Wales", because of its rarity in Wales and the significant loss of historic sites.

Set against these losses, the discovery of more than 30 new sites for *Usnea articulata* in the last five years is little short of astonishing. Almost half come from the under-worked county of Carmarthenshire, with others in Pembrokeshire, Glamorgan, Cardiganshire and Breconshire. The new easternmost sites in southern Breconshire are very close to the industrial valleys of south Wales and are surely an indication of new colonisation rather than being relicts, whilst the reported population at Penllergaer is within a stone's throw of Swansea, although it may be the result of a typing error (see below). The new colonies are mostly in windy, exposed situations on hillsides or in open valleys, albeit mostly on the leeward sides of trees; a few are more sheltered. Their distribution seems relatively random, albeit with clusters in Brechfa Forest (where SB lives), on the Carmel ridge, and in the southern Brecon Beacons. At the same time, Bob Haycock (pers. comm.) reports that U. articulata is "doing well" on roadside trees in the Martletwy area of Pembrokeshire (SN00) and is also seen regularly on Hawthorn in north Pembrokeshire, so the core population seems to be increasing. The discovery of further populations seems almost inevitable, although it is not really practical to actively search for *U. articulata* because it is so localised and so unpredictable: it is better just to remain ever-vigilant and to keep scanning tree-tops.



Details of the populations are given below, with new colonies in black font and known ones in grey

Thus there is considerable doubt over the accuracy of this record, which may just result from its accidental inclusion whilst typing up the species list.]




